
Mill River Natural Avea Georgia, Vermont

Conserved in 2003, Mill River Falls Natural Area is a 35-acre public access preserve encompassing the mouth of Mill River and the surrounding wetland complex. Enjoy a short hike down to an impressive waterfall which flows over a ledge of weathered stone into pools below. Below the waterfall, Mill River flows over rapids, through pools, and past old oxbows as it divides and meanders across the flat, ancient delta to its final destination, Lake Champlain. This natural area was donated to the Lake Champlain Land Trust by Anna Neville and her family. The conservation project was completed in partnership with the Georgia Conservation Commission.

Directions and Park Information:

From Burlington, take Interstate 89 North to Exit 18. Take Route 7 North for about 5.6 miles and take a left onto Mill River Road and follow it until you come to a T. There, the parking lot for Mill River Falls is directly in front of you. There are two ways to enter Mill River Falls. For the more extensive trail system, walk south down Georgia Shore Road across the bridge to The Pines Road. To access the trail, you must walk down the "The Pines Road" for a few yards, and the trailhead will be on your right. Or, to get to the falls from the north side of the river, follow the Mill River Falls Trail which leaves directly from the parking lot.

When you go: Mill River Falls is perfect for picnicking, fishing, cross-country skiing or snowshoeing. Notice the unique wetland communities along the trails. There are no facilities. Open dawn to dusk.
